ABOUT THE NEST

The **"NEST"** is the official publication of the Nueva Ecija University of Science and Technology provided by the National Library with an International Standard Serial Number of 2672-3743. This was established and approved in April 2018. The NEST aims to disseminate information regarding the fundamental undertakings of the faculty, administration, and staff for one whole year.

SYMBOLS AND MEANINGS:

The NEST stands for "Nurturing Ethical, Socially Responsible, and Taskdriven Professionals". Its logo is akin to a nest (the White Head) composed of people who are working together, nurtured and safeguarded by a reputable leader (The Hand holding the Head). Inside the HEAD are the TORCH that represents the Quality Services provided by the University, academically and non-academically, to its clientele; the BULB that symbolizes the ENLIGHTENMENT of the MIND and HEARTS of the students through the WILL POWER of every Faculty to help them be excellent in their chosen fields. Inside the bulb are: the GEAR that epitomizes the "Education" and the Mobility of Development, Growth, and Progress: the ATOM that symbolizes the NEUST being a Science and Technology institution; the HEAD symbolizes the NEST where the NEUST workforce resides with the leadership of a President; the TWO HANDS WITH TWO DIFFERENT COLORS holding the head that represent the stability of the President in handling the whole University and the people working together with one goal, and the two colors of the hands stand for the NEUST employees' DIVERSITY of views and opinions, expertise, attributes, uniqueness, situations, and contentment. With these, the President shows mobility and flexibility in handling these diversities with stability, tenacity, and decisiveness.

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EDITORIA LEADERSHIP and GOOD GOVERNANCE



Two weeks after the declaration of Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) last March 17, 2020, the College of Information and Communications Technology donated 300 pieces of facemask to the University. These facemasks were distributed to the front liners working at the different hospitals such as Dr. Paulino J. Garcia Memorial Research and Medical Center (PJGMRMC), Eduardo L. Joson Memorial Hospital (ELJMH), Good Samaritan Medical Center and Nueva Ecija Doctors' Hospital, Inc. (NEDHI)

Financial aids and food packs were also sent to five (5) BSIT

students who were not able to go home immediately when the implementation of the ECQ started. Four of these students were already sent home thru the help of the Department of Students Affairs (DSA) office headed by Dr. Mercedes Trajano and company.

The other one who availed of the assistance extended by the CICT was a sophomore student who statenow staying in his boarding house in Sumacab Este and is being monitored by the College. Likewise, HRM student-interns who were stranded in Boracay were also given financial assistance by the CICT.

At the on - set of the COVID-19 pandemic, the lack of protective materials was a big challenge. With the call for assistance and help of Dr. Gamilia, the University Physician and Head of NEUST COVID Task Force, Dr. Angelica O. Cortez, together with faculty the other members responded by creating improvised protective shields and face masks for the front liners. These self – made protective materials were distributed to the University Guard Personnel, University Medical Force, PJG Hospital, Talavera General Hospital, Red Cross, and other hospitals in the province.

With the support of COED faculty members, the College solicited PhP23, 500 which was used to provide financial assistance to the following:

COED students who stayed in their boarding houses or friends due to the lock down were give financial aid amounting to PhP1,000 to 1,500. Some faculty members participated in by monitoring the status of the students during the duration of the lock down until they were brought homes;

CORONA VIRUS '19

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses causing a range of illnesses, from the common cold to more serious infections such as those caused by Middle East Respiratory Syndrome-related Coronavirus (MERS-CoV) and Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome-related Coronavirus (SARS-CoV). Coronavirus can also cause a variety of diseases in farm animals and domesticated pets.




Where did the COVID-19 originate?

On December 2019, a clustering of pneumonia cases of unknown etiology was reported in Wuhan, China. The outbreak was later determined to be caused by a novel coronavirus or commonly termed as COVID 19, a new coronavirus strain that has not been previously identified in humans. How is the COVID-19 transmitted?

On January 24, 2020, the World Health Organization has confirmed human-to-human transmission largely in Wuhan City, China. However, there is no enough information yet to draw a definitive conclusion about the intensity of human-to-human transmission, full clinical features, and the original source of the outbreak.

What are the symptoms and possible complications of a coronavirus infection?



Common signs of coronavirus infection include:

- Flu-like and respiratory symptoms;
- Fever;
- Cough;
- Shortness of breath; and
- Breathing difficulties.

In severe cases, it can cause pneumonia, acute respiratory syndrome, kidney failure, and even death.

What can the public do to STOP the spread of COVID-19?

The Department of Health advises the public to:

- 1. Practice frequent and proper handwashing - wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- 2. Practice proper cough etiquette.
 - Cover mouth and nose using tissue or sleeves/bend of the elbow when coughing or sneezing.
 - Move away from people when coughing.
 - Do not spit.

- Throw away used tissues properly.
- Always wash your hands after sneezing or coughing.
- Use alcohol or sanitizer.
 Maintain distance of at least one meter away from individual/s experiencing respiratory symptoms.
- 4. Avoid unprotected contact with farm or wild animals (alive or dead), animal markets, and products that come from animals (such as uncooked meat).
- 5. Ensure that food is well-cooked.

To date, there are no specific vaccines or medicines for COVID-19. Treatments are under investigation, and will be tested through clinical trials. However, many of the symptoms can be treated based on the patient's clinical conditions. Supportive care for infected persons also be highly can effective.


Prevention

ECOSYSTEM ACCOUNTING for A Better Future NEWS FEATURE

Ecosystem Accounting is a new strategy to determine the natural assets that we have in a particular space. The concept originated from the System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA) of the United Nations (UN), where it is in complement with the Central Framework; thus, the conceptualization of Experimental Ecosystem Accounting. Ecosystem Accounting is defined as "a coherent and integrated approach to the assessment of the through environment the measurement of ecosystems, and measurement of the flows of services from ecosystems into economic and other human activity." (SEEA EEA, 2014).

So far, there are few research outputs conducted in the world adopt the SEEA that EEA framework. With its importance, there is a need to mainstream the concept for the people to appreciate the value of ecosystems, whether on a local or regional scale. For this to be possible, researches must be conducted to determine the ecosystem extent, condition, services, and capacity. In the the application of country, ecosystem accounting had been piloted so far at Laguna Lake and Southern Palawan. Thus, we need to further broaden its scale by influencing the local government



units (LGUs), including the academic community.

The Central Luzon Regional Development Plan 2017-2022. where the province of Nueva Ecija is located, identified ecosystem accounting as a challenge for the region. It was presented that there is the need to "institutionalize natural capital accounting and valuation of ecosystem services." This concept is definitely integrated under ecosystem accounting. In addition, the plan also highlighted that this is essential to provide policymakers, including the decision-makers a broader picture between natural resources and the economy.

With the continuous decline in our natural resources, we need to value this as baseline information as well as to check for the effectiveness of management schemes implemented by agencies and organizations across the country.

We should always bear in mind that, "managing the environment is like managing ourselves, if we do not act properly, expect the consequences of our actions" (JRT) 8th National Conference of Restoration Ecology Society of the Philippines – Saving the Cordilleras Ecosystem Network, (RESPhil-SCENe) Inc.




The application of Office Mix enables one to create an audio or video explanation attached in every slide, just like a teacher is explaining the lesson inside the classroom. Because of this, one of the colleges in Tarlac, Golden Olympus Colleges, requested to have another slot of training to their faculty members and was conducted last June 16, 20120. Mrs. Helen Grace V. Angeles, a fulltime faculty member of the Graduate School, was the lecturer of the said online training.

The Graduate School did not stop in delivering alternative modes of learning that educators must be adaptive enough to realize the implications of the said pandemic on curriculum and other related factors and consider reframing education for the new normal. The other webinar conducted by the Graduate School was about "Online Training on Reframing Education for the New Normal," which was held last June 17, 2020, with 668 attendees all over the Philippines. Dr. Sheryl Lyn C. Monterola, Professor 3 of the College of Education in UP, Diliman, Q. C. was the guest speaker.

The lecture of the speaker started by stating some statistical facts about the current and latest update about COVID 19 and its impact on people. Along with the

discussion, she cited some implications of the said fatal disease to the curriculum, its effects on the alternative delivery modes of learning, and research as well. She related and led the discussion in some possible approaches that may be considered as we manage the situation might be considered while managing the situation by anticipating the new frames of education for the new normal. After the lecture, a short open forum was facilitated as the speaker addressed the queries of the viewer.



The NEUST Training Director, Dr. Jo Neil T. Peria concluded the webinar with few words of gratitude to all the participants who graced the event and most especially, to the ever efficient speaker Dr. Monterola. The live webinar was successfully conducted through the help of the facilitators, Dr. Nancy Joy Mangansat, the Graduate School Research Unit Head, Dr. Estrelita L. Bernardo, the Graduate School Extension Unit Head, and Engr. Juan Paolo P. Mueca of the College of Engineering.

To equip the participants with the necessary skills to perform effective action research that would help in addressing classroom issues such as motivation, instruction, and classroom management, a Massive Open Online Course on Action Research in the Classroom was conducted and participated in by 708 attendees. The online course consisted of four modules. 


Dean Cortez tasked the Chairperson of the Elementary

The University's **College of Criminology (COC)** was even hailed as the **number one** performing school in Region III in terms of board exam performance;


